Sara Dick—*joining by letter of transfer from Shalom Mennonite Church, Newton, KS*

I believe that Jesus Christ embodies God's peace, freedom, well-being and salvation, and that the church is Christ's current body. I first became conscious of the church as Christ's body here at BCMC as a young child, and then as a youth. I moved away from Kansas after college, and Christian community continued to be an essential part of my discipleship, providing me with support, accountability and encouragement to discern and love and act out of Christ's wisdom rather than out of fear or insecurity or hatred. I look forward to learning with this community again, and am grateful for your welcome to Alahna and me.

Dawn Yoder Harms—*joining by letter of transfer from Assembly Mennonite Church, Goshen, IN*

I grew up in a small Mennonite church in Bloomington, Illinois, where even as a child I was given opportunity to be actively involved in the life of our congregation. I was baptized there at age 12.

As I was beginning high school, our little church merged with the First Mennonite Church of Normal, and we together became a dually affiliated General Conference/Mennonite Church congregation. In this new congregation, I tasted a different flavor of "Mennonite," enjoyed a vibrant youth group, and was provided with generous space to learn and practice leadership skills.

In college, I experienced a crisis of faith, during which I found myself questioning many of the beliefs I had absorbed as a child. My intense questions led me to Seminary, not with the intent of becoming a pastor, but as a way to begin picking up the pieces of a shattered faith and putting them back together in a new way. This faith "re-integration" has been a rich process that continues to this day.

After beginning our married life, Doug and I moved into a long chapter of service with MCC. Through these experiences of meaningful connection with our global family, as well as ongoing studies at Seminary and a deepening faith, I began to more clearly hear a call to ministry. In 1997, I responded to this call by accepting an invitation to serve as a pastor at Akron Mennonite Church (Akron, PA). That experience and others beyond have confirmed my sense of pastoral calling.

Over the years, I have been privileged to be part of faith communities that were willing to hold my questions, welcome my gifts, offer support and guidance, and challenge me. They have helped me see God more clearly. I hope to be part of such a community here at Bethel College Mennonite Church and look forward to learning from you and sharing with you along the way.

Doug Harms—*joining by letter of transfer from Assembly Mennonite Church, Goshen, IN*

I grew up in a family of the Mennonite persuasion the oldest of three children. During these growing up years we moved around some, living in communities where we attended non-Mennonite churches, after having spent my earlier years attending Bethel College Mennonite Church. While in the 7th grade, I went through catechism and was baptized in the Presbyterian church we were a part of at the time. I entered a period of questioning about matters of faith through my high school and college years, and yet through it all remained connected to the Christian faith, particularly to the Mennonite/Anabaptist tradition of faith.

Dawn and I were married in 1981, and in 1983 entered into service with Mennonite Central Committee (MCC), serving three terms in various parts of the world. Interspersed between MCC terms of service were stints at Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) in Elkhart, IN. I continued with MCC, having served/worked with this organization for over 25 years.

I still have many questions and concerns about faith and life, especially about some of the more traditional formulations and concepts. In this all I am on a journey, a journey which I desire to share with others who are committed to a life of love and care of ourselves, others, and God's creation.

Eric Massanari—*joining by letter of transfer from New Creation Fellowship, Newton, KS*

From the beginning of my life I was steeped in an Anabaptist Christian family and culture. When Menno-folk ask about my last name I like to tell them I'm from a rare but passionate stream of Italian Mennonites. In truth, I deeply value that one branch of my family tree that grows from Italian Catholic roots (the other branches are decidedly Swiss/German "Old Mennonites"). There is something in that broader history that shows up in my life-long passion for ecumenical connections and learning. I feel grateful for my upbringing and continued formation among Mennonites, and I have also found my faith indelibly marked by encounters with other Christians, with people of other faiths and with those who struggle with religious expression in any form.

Most of my childhood years were spent in Iowa City, IA and I was baptized at the age of fourteen at First Mennonite Church in Iowa City. I spent my college years at Goshen College in Indiana (1986-1990). Following college my wife, Yolanda Kauffman, and I lived in her home state of Oregon for five years, two of which were spent in voluntary service at Drift Creek Mennonite Camp and Retreat Center. It was during our time in service that I found a sense of clarity that I wanted to attend seminary. We moved to Denver, CO where I studied in the M.Div. program at Iliff School of Theology. While at Iliff I discerned a sense of call to pastoral ministry, which led to a fourteen-year pastorate at Shalom Mennonite Church (Newton, KS), and then to my present ministry as chaplain at Kidron Bethel Village and as a spiritual director with individuals in the local community. My spiritual journey today is shaped more by relationships than by religious doctrine, more by community than by formal confessions of faith, and more by the God whom I encounter in daily, lived experience than the God I might read about or hear about secondhand. I experience God in my life more intimately as a Beloved Friend and more broadly as the loving, creative impulse that is the Source of Life—a God who is immanently present in all things, and transcendently beyond all that I think I know or understand. My ongoing spiritual growth is nurtured by my family, my community, my vocation, a practice of contemplative prayer, reading/writing poetry and long-distance running, among many other things. I am grateful for the welcome we have received at BCMC and am excited to be joining in membership. I know I will have much to learn here!

For the first four years we gathered often with family where we all attended the Church of the Brethren in Hartville. At four years of age our immediate family moved to Louisville, Ohio and we began attending the Evangelical United Brethren Church in Louisville. We were always very involved with
