The carbon calculator built into the site also provides you with carbon comparisons to other activities. For example, you flew from New York to London this year? You could have stayed home and watched 77,000 hours of TV instead. Or eaten 86,625 bananas. Either way, it's the same as the annual perperson emissions of someone living in Venezuela.
