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Welcome to Renee Reimer, the new Associate Pastor for **Faith Formation**

come Associate Pastor for Faith Formation, starting August 5. Renee received an MDiv degree with an emphasis in faith formation from Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) on May 4.

After the Search Committee conducted a "quiet visit" with Renee in Wichita on March 2, the Church Board affirmed the committee's recommendation that she candidate for the position, which was announced to the congregation on March 17.

Renee was in North Newton April 5-7. She spent time with pastor Dawn Yoder Harms; visited over meals with the Search Committee, Church Board, Faith Formation Commission, Agape Class (young adults) and senior high youth and sponsors; and met with Bethel College campus pastor Peter Goerzen and several students. At five, hour-long sessions with Renee, 83 people shared what originally brought them to BCMC, what they appreciated about their Sunday school

classes and the church as a whole, and how they viewed faith formation across the age spectrum. On Sunday, Renee gave the sermon during worship, and shared her faith journey and answered questions during the Christian education hour.

After worship on April 14, members voted 185-1 to invite Renee to become our next faith formation pastor. She wrote in response, "I was humbled by the vote of affirmation calling me to be your pastor this past Sunday, and I am pleased to accept your calling to walk with you as your pastor. The candidating weekend felt like a coming home to a church and a people that have been pivotal pieces of my faith journey. I am looking forward to where we continue to journey together come August."

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Renee graduated from Bethel College with a bachelor's degree in music education in May 2014. From 2011 to 2014, she directed the BCMC junior choir, including engaging youth as well as children in the musical "Godspell Junior." She was the Worship and the Arts Symposium events coordinator while at Bethel, interim music coordinator at our church for a short time, and music director at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Newton.

Renee went on to serve as vouth and outreach ministries director at Rainbow Mennonite Church, Kansas City, which solidified her interest in becoming a pastor. She also led music and taught at Village Presbyterian Preschool in Prairie Village, was the Vital Worship Grant project director at Rainbow, served as a camp pastor at Rocky Mountain Mennonite Camp, and has been chapel coordinator and assistant while at AMBS.

This summer Renee will assist with a Rocky Mountain Mennonite Camp session in June, coordinate the Mennonite Church USA convention Children's Program in Kansas City in early July, and help with junior high camp at Mennoscah in mid-July.

Giving From Our Abundance

51st Annual Kansas Mennonite Relief Sale April 12 and 13, 2019

It is impossible for me to think about the MCC relief sale without thinking of hymns and spiritual songs. In my mind and in my soul, the coming together of the 70 odd anabaptist congregations and supporting groups as they serve the Lord is an act of Christian love, Christian identity and Christian service. The entire week from set up to take down is an act of worship. "Great is thy Faithfulness".

This year was not without its bumps and challenges. Indeed there was plenty of opportunity for us to engage in prayer and join together in one voice for the benefit of MCC and helping those less fortunate...acting out of our own abundance, and our desire to serve God.

We had some key volunteer spots to fill. It was not always clear where we were going and who was going to fill those spots. But volunteers stepped up. Groups who have been on the periphery of the sale agreed to help cut and bake sausage on Saturday. The help and smiles of the Yoder Amish, combined with the humor and hard work of the Working Men of Christ produced the baked sausage at a rate that allowed them to get ahead and enjoy some of the rest of the sale. For

volunteers seeking to serve God, we are thankful.

Another bump was the decision of the Kansas Department of Revenue to change the regulations concerning charging and remitting sales tax as it related to the Kansas Mennonite Relief Sale. A whole host of MCC's Angels contacted their congressmen and senators, and the decision was reversed, at least for one year. Young people, board members, booth chairmen, and an 80 year old lady, engaged their representatives and senators in conversations that put pressure on the Kansas Department of Revenue. I am not sure what the future holds at this point, but I know that we will have more time to deal with it before next year, and that we will have more opportunity to offer ourselves as servants of the Lord.

But bumps in the road also provide opportunity. Opportunity to raise money, opportunity to form community, opportunity for us to give from our abundance in so many ways. Our sole purpose is to raise money to donate to the Mennonite Central Committee....and we will do that. The initial tabulation from last weekend is \$504,296... and we know there will be some additional monies that will continue to come in for the next month or so. The ability for a community to come together, thinking more of others than of themselves, is what makes it possible to raise over a half million dollars in 24 hours. And everyone who has contributed to the sale in any way gave from

their abundance.

Thank you to the many people in this congregation who contributed in so many ways. Creating quilts that are works of art. Creating and donating crafts that will continue to please long after the sale is over. Helping to set up the quilts at the sale, baking bread, going to Hillsboro to make verenike, or to Moundridge to make bohne beroggi. Signing up to serve at the Feeding of the Multitude or to help with children's activities...all are examples of giving from our abundance.

Was the sale a success? Yes, in so many ways. But the biggest success is being able to provide health care, food, emergency relief, school opportunities, and empowerment to people around the world.

As Chairman, I am pleased to be part of an organization that seeks to do only good, to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, and to help those who do not share our abundance. I thank you, BCMC, from the bottom of my heart.

I also thank you for the many prayers, words of support, and concern for my well being as I have struggled with illness as well as trying to stay a little bit involved in the sale. I needed to be involved, at least a little bit, for the sale is a grand and glorious way to serve the Lord.

Lucy treasures wandering in the woods along the deer trails. Their family has a remote camera that allows them to view the deer, a

coyote, and the occasional human trespasser. The Burch household includes Skip, the thirteen-year-old dog, and six cats – two different sets of kittens and two cats that "came with the house."

In addition to a pet-lover, Lucy describes herself as friendly, loyal, curious and fun -loving. Parking Issues

Places to park at BCMC – this has been a rising concern for some in the congregation. Various solutions have been attempted. On the heels of multiple conversations be-

tween "church and college," BCMC's Bethel College Relations Team (BCRT) is taking its turn at understanding and seeking to address the issue.

Knowing that Haury Hall (the dorm directly to the north of our church building) is a freshmen dorm, the college has given BCRT a spot to connect with incoming students at Bethel's August freshman orientation. BCRT sees an opportunity here -- personal welcome and an in-person explanation about our parking needs in the life of our congregation.

One significant finding has been this: we here at Bethel College Mennonite Church have a range of feelings regarding this parking issue. Some in our congregation are weary that spots are continually filled, some in our congregation are personally in relationship with new Bethel students and see the issue more from the student's point of view. Parking near their new "home" seems basic. Congregations in other locations do not have this parking issue, but wish for ways of interacting with Bethel students. We have a challenge and an opportunity.

Regardless of how this conversation unfolds, how we speak with our neighbors will be just as important as what solutions are decided upon. Let's lift ourselves, Bethel College and its students in our prayers as we extend our hand in this ongoing sharing and negotiating of resources. ~ Susan Jantzen

Jacob D. Goering, died
on his 101st birthday, at

Kidron Bethel Village. He was born on the family farm in Lone Tree Township, KS, the 5th of 9 children of Christian B. and Adina Goering,. He graduated from Moundridge HS in 1935 and from Bethel College in 1941 with a major in history and psychology. He married Beth Eldridge in 1941. During World War II, Jacob and Beth served in CPS camps in Oregon and California. After the war, Jacob, Beth and their family moved to Chicago, where Jake earned a B.D. at Bethany Seminary and began his graduate education at the University of Chicago in the new field of human development. Jake was a psychologist at Brook Lane Farm, a Mennoniteaffiliated psychiatric hospital in Smithsburg, MD. He completed graduate work at the University of Maryland while working full time at Brook Lane Farm. They moved to Silver Spring, MD. Jacob received his doctorate in 1959 and remained at the university as a professor in the Institute for Child Study until his retirement in 1983. Jacob received his Diploma in Analytical Psychology from the Jung Institute, Zurich, in 1978. He began a private psychotherapy practice, which he maintained after retirement from the university and until he and Beth moved to Kansas in 1996. Upon retirement in North Newton he raised funds and developed the Sand Creek walking trail among many other volunteer activities. He is survived by children J. Daniel Goering (Marian) Albuquerque, NM; Kathleen McMahon (Kevin), Columbia, MD; Barbra Goering (James Murray), Chicago, IL; sister Evelyn Lehman (Ralph) North Newton; 5 grandchildren; 7 great -grandchildren. Beth preceded him in death in 2011.
