Faith Statements – Reception into Membership at BCMC November 8, 2015

Brad Born (transferring from Shalom Mennonite Church, Newton) I was baptized at 13 years of age, too early to have developed a fully reflective faith, but not too early to have understood and admired how Christian faith had prompted my parents to perform ten years of missionary service in southern Brazil. Those childhood years as a pastor's kid and missionary kid were highly formative, combining a devout piety at home and in Portuguese-speaking churches with immersion in cross-cultural education at an international school and through close friendships with Brazilian neighbors. What my parents modeled already then, and what I found attractive about Christian faith, was its capacity to foster compassion for others and engagement with the wider world. Following college, my wife and I spent ten years in Lawrence, Kansas, where our active membership in the Lawrence Mennonite Church provided further faith development. We then moved to Newton in 1995 when I took a faculty position at Bethel College, and we soon transferred our membership from Lawrence Mennonite to Shalom Mennonite, which was a very welcoming and supportive congregation, especially well-suited to that stage of our life raising children. Recently having reached another transition point, with our youngest child leaving home to begin his freshman year at Bethel College, we have been exploring making a church change, and upon visiting Bethel College Mennonite Church throughout the late spring and summer months, we are ready to make this our new church home.

Diane Born (*transferring from Shalom Mennonite Church, Newton*) As a child, I attended a Mennonite Brethren church in southwestern Kansas with my family. When I was a young teen, I was baptized and joined the church. As an adult, I have been active in Mennonite congregations where we have lived. I look forward to being a member of the Bethel College Mennonite Church joining others in worship and striving to live faithfully in the local community and world.
