Leidy is from the Mennonite Church of Berna in Bogota, Colombia, and while we both come from distinct cultures and places in the world, we have found common ground in our Mennonite Anabaptist faith.

In February we both began a three-year service term with MCC in Bolivia where we now reside. We are living in the city of Cochabamba, which in Quechua means *land of the lagoons*. Couched in a valley within the Andes Mountains, Cochabamba is a gateway city between the vast low-lying plains of eastern Bolivia and the isolated high plains of western Bolivia.

Leidy and I will be co-facilitating an MCC program called Seed. This young adult program focuses on community accompaniment and peacebuilding. Volunteers will commit for a two-year service term working with Bolivian organizations.
