

**Virginia Mininger**—joining by transfer from Hesston Mennonite Church, Hesston, KS

The Holmes County Mennonite Community in Central Ohio provided the foundation for my early faith formation. Mennonite parents, grandparents, relatives, role models and peers nurtured the development of my core Christian values and ideals. Being baptized and confirmed as a young believer at Martins Creek Mennonite Church was an expected given. I consciously reaffirmed the decision to become a disciple of Jesus at evangelical tent revivals rampant during that era, but my spiritual growth and understandings gradually occurred as a natural outgrowth through active participation in the church and Christian community. As a young adult, my Goshen College experience broadened my geographical borders, academic sights and world view. These factors along with significant musical experiences fostered more depth and understanding of worship. The importance of music and singing to my worship has continued through my life. During graduate school, marital, professional and parental years, a spectrum of national and international churches and Christian Fellowships (most recently Hesston Mennonite Church) shaped my growing awareness of the church and its mission. I believe that all who follow Jesus all around the world are the church together. I value the continuing heritage and mission of the BCMC community and look forward to continued participation as a member.

Carolyn Penner—joining by transfer from First Mennonite Church, Hillsboro, KS

Born in McPherson, I was baptized as an infant in the Methodist Church and joined upon my affirmation of faith when I was twelve. When we married, Don and I were Methodists until we moved to Hillsboro, our first opportunity to be members of a Mennonite congregation; we have been members of the First Mennonite Church family for fifty years. I was baptized in 1950 at the Gnadenberg (Grace Hill) Mennonite Church. I have been an active member at three other churches, with the last 50 years being at Hillsboro First Mennonite Church. When I was growing up, we lived less than one or four miles from the church except for two years when we lived in Newton. As a child, I learned that church was very important to my family; for example, my father took our family of five 7 1/2 miles to the church Christmas program in a horse drawn wagon over snowy roads, not drivable by car. In October, when I was in the seventh grade, our home was destroyed by fire; everything was lost. The love of the church and of neighbors was shown in many ways; along with helping with clean up, they also provided food, clothes, money, and prayer support. After the fire, we lived that winter in a garage. The church family has influenced me in forming my Christian beliefs. I feel membership with other believers will help me as I continue my faith walk.
