Faith Statements from those joining BCMC today

Jake Friesen-transferring from Trinity Mennonite Church, Glendale, AZ I was born to Russian immigrants and grew up on Vancouver Island. Being a PK, life revolved around the church. I was baptized at the age of 17 at the Black Creek United Mennonite Church upon the confession of my faith in God. My senior college year was at Bethel College in 1959-60. Then went to seminary (AMBS—Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary), where I met my wife. We both graduated in 1963. We then spent four years in Mennonite Central Committee partially as a result of my father's many stories of being kept alive because of the former MCC soup kitchens during the Russian revolution, when many people died of starvation. My flying hobby developed into my profession. During our many moves we were active in the local church. In our 27 years in Arizona we helped in the development of Goldensun, a faith-based community of adults with developmental disabilities, VORP, a victim offenders reconciliation program, and were very involved at Trinity Mennonite Church, from where we are transferring our membership. Micah 6:8 has been a very important verse throughout my life.

Jane (Herstine) Friesen—transferring from Trinity Mennonite Church, Glendale, AZ

I was born in eastern Pennsylvania and grew up near Quakertown. For some reason I was baptized at age 3 by a Reformed minister. I accepted Christ as my Savior at Camp Men-O-Lan at age 10. After Catechism classes at age 13, I was baptized and joined the small General Conference Mennonite church near our home. Sunday school teachers had a profound influence on my life growing up and I became active in the church. Bluffton College and seminary at AMBS contributed to my faith development as a disciple of Christ. After Jake and I married, we served in MCC for four years, at Akron, PA and in Mississippi in the 1960s. During our moves around the country I worked with many pastors as secretary, taught all ages in Sunday school, and served in other ways. Prayer and growing in knowledge of the Scriptures have always been important to me, as well as enjoying fellowship in community with people in a variety of denominations. My life verse is Galatians 2:20; and Philippians chapter 2 has been especially important to me.

Homer Goering, transferring from Hope Presbyterian Church, Austin, TX I grew up on a farm near Pretty Prairie and was baptized as a teenager in the First Mennonite Church. My parents were dedicated Christians and their fervent efforts to keep me on the straight and narrow were mostly successful. After completing college and being employed in several different parts of the country, I joined the 5th Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City in the late '60s. I have been a Presbyterian ever since and was a member of Hope Presbyterian Church Austin, TX, for 30 years. I respect greatly the Mennonite traditions, particularly the commitments to serve the Lord by assisting people in need around the globe. I am very honored to join this body of believers.

Mary Goering, transferring from Hope Presbyterian Church, Austin, TX

Although I was not raised as a Mennonite, I embrace the BCMC Common Purpose Statement. I believe in following Jesus' example of accepting others, no matter their beliefs or circumstances, and interacting with them in a caring way. Baptized and raised in England in the Episcopal tradition and then being involved for 30 years in a Presbyterian Church in Austin, TX, my faith has been tested and strengthened many times. Worship is a meaningful and important part of my faith journey, regularly affirming my love of God. I strive to serve others, especially using the skills I learned and practiced as a Stephen Minister, by listening and being the heart and hands of Christ to those in need.
