

Reformation Sunday (always the last Sunday in October) is marked in Protestant churches for the reformers like Zwingli, Luther, Calvin, etc. However, the Anabaptists did not want to reform the church but declared that believer's baptism, separation of church and state, and holy living were the true marks of the church, hence called the "Radical Reformation".
