BCMC Welcomes Todd Schlosser

On February 1, BCMC welcomed Todd Schlosser as our Interim Pastor, beginning a new relationship for us and launching a new phase of Todd's pastoral ministry. From Regina, Saskatchewan, Todd graduated from the University of Regina and received a Master of Divinity degree from Anabaptist residents within the last few Mennonite Biblical Seminary in 1999. Todd brings experience in pastoral ministry from serving congregations in Saskatchewan, Indiana, Manitoba, and Kansas. In 2002, Todd and his wife Lynn, whom he met at AMBS, began serving as copastors at Bergthal Mennonite Church which became a significant church home for their whole family. As a result of a church visioning process, Todd and Lynn chose to release the small church from paying two pastors, and Todd left his pasto- for Todd to again pursue pasral role at the end of 2006. Lynn remained as pastor there until 2013 when the church closed. Desiring for their family to relate to just one church, Todd found employment first briefly with Mennonite Mutual Aid and then as campus pastor (a senior management position) at Mennonite Friendship Communities in South

Hutchinson. Todd's leadership and administrative skills became evident, and he was eventually tapped to become administrator there and later also worked in nursing home administration in Clearwater and then in Little River, bidding farewell to his staff and weeks.

Throughout his tenure in nursing home administration, Todd had always hoped to return to congregational ministry. In 2019, Todd became a member of the Western District Conference Ministerial Leadership Commission. With their children, Jonathan (at Kansas State University) and Rebecca (attending Bethel in fall), leaving home, the family decided that the time is right toral ministry. Todd submitted his Ministerial Leadership Information packet to Mennonite Church USA in June, 2021, for a position in pastoral ministry.

During conversation with Todd, one gets a strong sense of a man who treasures relationship—with God, with the church, with family,

and with the broader community. He states that "God is love and is calling us into relationship with God and each other...we need to love and respect one another" and put aside separation. He believes that we should be the church together, providing a space for all to be loved and to express themselves as each discerns the meaning of scripture for themselves.

When contemplating the time ahead with BCMC, Todd says he is "not a traditional interim pastor" and is ready to do whatever the church wants and needs, working with us to "create a space where God is able to work in our lives". He plans to focus on building good relationships with our church and its members; helping the church release any tension or strain inherent in a pastoral transition; and supporting the church as we reflect back, process, and prepare for our future.

Todd's wife Lynn currently serves as pastor at Mennonite Church of the Servant in Wichita. In November, the family moved to 3225 Southwood Court in the Royer West area of Newton where they plan to put down roots. Together, Todd and Lynn are enjoying working on their house, spending time with family playing games or watching movies,

and are looking forward to Bethel events next year and exploring what it means to have children out of the home. The household includes two well-loved dogs and three cats. As a younger man, Todd was a competitive tennis player and still follows tennis as well as Canadian sports, especially one particular football team in Canada. He's been attempting to immerse himself in Kansas sports as well and would welcome persuasive arguments about which teams deserve his support!

A service of installation and blessing for Todd was held Sunday, February 6, with Kathy Neufeld Dunn of Western District Conference. Kathy preached on God's presence in times of transition. 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BCMC Joins the Supportive Communities Network



On June 3, 2001, BCMC started the pro-

cess of discernment recommended by the Supportive Communities Network (SCN), which included local speakers and group discussions, with the intent to vote whether to join SCN. On June 2, 2002, BCMC approved the Welcoming Statement which has since been printed in the church bulletin and is posted on our website. Since then, MCUSA, Western District Conference, and our congregation have all made moves toward accepting the different ways in which we all seek to follow Christ as many individuals and congregations advocate for more inclusivity of GBLTQ+ people. In November of 2020, the Inclusion Task Group was asked by the Church Board to survey the congregation on whether the church wanted to sign the Resolution for Repentance and Transformation created by the Inclusive Mennonite Pastors for MCUSA. A survey of the congregation showed that 95% of those who responded were in favor of doing so. On January 3, 2021, Epiphany Sunday, we celebrated our church's support of this resolution.

Soon after the signing of the resolution, the Inclusion Task Group moved onto its next task which was to gauge the congregation's

doing some initial education about SCN in February and March of 2021, a congregational survey at the end of March revealed that 92% of respondents affirmed BCMC's joining of SCN. The Church Board then took action in their April meeting to affirm our membership to SCN. Carol Wise, SCN Coordinator, suggested that Leann Toews from Goessel could represent SCN in welcoming BCMC into the Supportive Communities Network. Leann joined us in worship on August 29. She noted the important step we have taken in making a public statement of support for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer+ individuals who are part of our churches and communities and the importance of our witness to the college and community. She presented our SCN Membership Certificate to the congregation. Austin Prouty designed the artwork shown here to represent our status. He used part of his design on a banner which we hung in the front of the church on August 29 and has been hanging at the back of the sanctuary since then. This design was used on the church bulletin. We hope to exhibit Austin's design in its entirety some time in the future.

On September 25, about 30 members of BCMC marched in the Wichita Pride Parade, carrying our banner from the old County Courthouse in Wichita at 3rd and Central to Century II. We will continue to show our welcoming status in various ways as we move forward. We have added a book to

After a dislaimer of there being "not much interThe family moved to Kingman in 1946, and John had his school years there. He was always drawn to physical activities – basketball, football and track, of course, but also just spending hours with friends on their bicycles riding to the river, the bluffs, wherever the path took them.

John credits Robert Unruh with developing his appreciation for music while at Kingman High School, and particularly remembers performing "Amahl and the NIght Visitors" while a student there. Credit also goes to the group that gathered evenings at the "Loafers' Bench" at his father's gas station for much of his not-so-formal education!

The decision to attend Bethel College was largely due to the fact that classmate Brian Schrag needed a roommate, and as it turned out, 34 of his high school quartet made the trip. So the commitment was made - for one vear - since John didn't have a better plan in mind at the time. Business and Econ classes with J. Lloyd Spaulding, athletics, and the College Choir filled his time nicely, and one year flowed naturally into four. Along the way, John began wondering whether or not he wanted to spend his life as a solitary figure, and decided he'd rather not. One Sandra Schrag caught his eye, and through numerous conversations at Larry's Drive-In, the relationship blossomed.

After his graduation, John found work at Hesston Corp, shared a basement apartment in Newton with Jim "Scribbles" Krehbiel, and continued to see Sandy while she

completed her studies at Bethel. They married in August of 1966, and prepared to go to Colombia. Visa difficulties delayed their departure, but eventually they made it to Bogota, via Mexico City and Panama. (There is some difference between John's and Sandy's memories of that trip, but this is John's story, so we must go with his recollection!) One clear shared memory is that shortly after their arrival, John became very sick. The doctor was called, probably by Marlene Habegger, and John was diagnosed with a strangesounding disease. John did not especially their athletic speak Spanish, and although Sandy was conversationally fluent, medical terminology was not in her repertoire. It was a huge relief when the exotic condition revealed itself to be chicken pox! John and Sandy served in Bogota through 1967, 1968 and much of 1969, teaching, studying, and working with other volunteers who came through. As their time in Colombia came to an end, plans were made for a return to Kansas. John again found work at the Corp for the summer, painting a lot of yellow lines with the maintenance department, and in fall they moved to Lawrence where Sandy began work on her Master's at KU, and John worked nights at Watkins Hospital (now the Student Health Center) "finding records and filing records." Not wanting to waste the opportunity while there, John completed another degree from the KU School of Business.

In 1973, they moved to North Newton, where their son Jonathan was born in September. Brother Brian joined the family in 1977. John returned

to Hesston Corp – in the office this time – and worked there for 40+ years, through the changes to Hay & Forage and AGCO, but always doing something with materials. He retired in 2010 and has had no problem finding things with which to keep busy since then.

A favorite way to spend time is going to the Schrag Pasture, where he has planted fruit trees and enjoys feeding the fish in the pond. Following his grandchildren in their activities, pursuits, is rewarding also. And speaking of his grandchildren, each of them was asked to share some thoughts about their Grandpa Zerger.

From Addison: "When I think of my grandpa, I think of the sweetest man, so pure and kind. If I had to describe him in one word, I would say,,, genuine. He truly is the kindest, funniest, most amazing grandpa ever. You can always be sure that he will answer your questions with the most tiny details, or always have a pocket knife on hand for any of your troubles with tricky packaging. You can always talk to him about coins, and he will never turn down a ham sandwich. My fondest memory... is every time we visit his house, he and my grandma stand in the driveway when we leave and wave goodbye until we are out of sight."

Alli and Madey share this list:

 listening to his stories of Duke, Daddy and Uncle Jon (the opossum in the garage and the trash can story) - He doesn't want anything for Christmas except to see his family and a ham sandwich

Happy 80th Birthday Norma Johnson! July 26, 1941



Conversations with Norma Johnson cover a lot of ground, just as she has in her 80 years of

life! Born on July 26, 1941, to a mother who turned 17 just

three days after her birth, Norma has many memories of farm life and generational family connections in and around Casselton, North Dakota. Four brothers joined her family over the next 16 years. They maintain close ties and are able to enjoy reunions as often as possible. Youngest brother Tim was diagnosed with early-onset Alzheimer's disease ten years ago, and time spent with him and his gift of photography has been extra special. (*Note: This interview was held prior to Tim's death in November.) Norma stated that she's been interviewed numerous times for BCMC publications, and didn't want to just cover old ground, so instead she focused on "Changes for Women in Ministry" as the theme for this one.

Growing up in the North Central Conference of the "OM" Church, there were very clear expectations about what was possible, and not possible, for women. Norma always wanted to be a teacher, and began to pursue her higher education at Hesston College. While there, the college choir and involvement with small groups were highlights, and opened her eyes to new ways of thinking about the "givens" of her home church upbringing. After taking the bold stand of cutting her hair, she had conversations with college staff who didn't necessarily share her enlightened worldview, and informed her that, her apparent gifts to the contrary, she had also "cut off" some possibilities for her future. Graduating from Goshen College in 1963 did lead her to a

position in Fargo, where she taught for six years before going to Kenya with Mennonite Central Committee, returning to North Dakota, and then heading to Botswana, again with MCC, where her gifts for both teaching and program administration began to be realized. Upon her return, she took a position at the MCC offices in Akron, and while there was encouraged to attend a seminar sponsored by AMBS, (at that time, Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary) which led to "a little preaching" and a slow, somewhat reluctant, acceptance (on the part of churches in the area) of the notion that yes, a woman might just be a good candidate for an actual seminary degree. Still, the thought of actually pastoring a church was not yet on the horizon. Her work in church leadership, however, was just taking off. Even though there were some problems with what the "old version" of the application form assumed about candidates, Norma became the first woman selected to head a Commission in the General **Conference Mennonite** Church. (Her mother, it must be said, was "humbly proud" of that!) She spent ten years heading the Commission on Education, and was one of the first 11 women to be ordained in the Western District Conference, working with former **BCMC** Pastor Darrell Fast.

Norma also mentioned the changes in hymnals over the years, beginning with the "Red Hymnal" in 1969, through "Hymnal: a Worship Book", and now "Voices Together". More than just shifting the placement of "606" and the cooperative venture with the Church of the Brethren, she notes the use of Scripture resources, the lectionary text connections, and the visual enhancements as additions she appreciates.

As Norma continues to experience new roles in her church involvement, she has also picked up a few new "later in life" interests – "coloring" with colored pencils, especially floral designs, and cryptograms! And she and Vern Preheim celebrated 23 years of marriage in August.

Norma, you continue to be an inspiration and a leader, and we thank you for your service and life here at BCMC.

Happy 80th Birthday Joyce Holck! July 29, 1941



four children. Growing up on the farm north of Goessel gave her many early opportunities for honing her work ethic, as well as learning practical skills. She vividly recalls "milking Birdie at 6" – the age of six, not necessarily at 6:00! Her early school years were spent at Pleasant Valley School (in McPherson County) and Gordon Grade School (Goessel) before attending Goessel High School, graduating with the Class of 1959. Her home congregation was Alexanderwohl Mennonite Church, where she was baptized as a sophomore in high school by Rev. P. A. Wedel. She particularly enjoyed music and drama in high school, and was disappointed that there were no sports for girls at that time, as she would have enjoyed participating in volleyball and baseball. Joyce went on to Bethel College, and then worked at several jobs while helping her husband through college. One of her positions was working for the General Conference Board of Missions, with Orlando Waltner and Andrew Shelly as her bosses. An early dictation session with Orlando began a steep learning curve, as the names of places in India were not yet familiar to her, and she had to check spellings along the way! Yet, being a very relational person, Joyce soon learned to recognize the places, as well as all of the workers by name.

Joyce's two daughters, Lori Schmidt Harrison, and Sandra Schmidt Smith, both attended Bethel College, and while they were there, Joyce's first marriage ended. She remarried two and a half years later, and after just five months, her husband was diagnosed with leukemia, and died fifteen months after their marriage. Marvin Holck came into her life on a blind date in December, 1991, at a Christmas party. (Joyce's daughter Lori was Marv's boss at the time!)

They married October 18, 1992, and Joyce gained two more daughters, Beth Holck Rosa, and Brenda Holck Spurgeon.

Joyce and Marvin joined BCMC in 1996, where she says she always found the congregation to be very welcoming, and has always felt comfortable with the choice. Marvin died on November 1, 2020, from dementia, after 28 years of marriage. Dyck Arboretum was a special place for them, and the family planted a tree there in his memory.

Joyce's four grandchildren are spread throughout the Midwest. Molly (Smith) is a fifth grade teacher in Chicago; Ben (Smith) is a senior business major at KU; Max (Smith) is in the K-State aviation program based on the Salina campus; and Kaley (Spurgeon) is a sophomore at Maize High School. Joyce enjoys attending her dance recitals whenever possible.

Hesston Corp/Hay & Forage/AGCO occupied Joyce's working life from 1979 until her retirement in 2006. She again expanded her knowledge of places and things unfamiliar when working in the International Department with the Romanian contact with Hesston/ Fiat. (Asking Joyce about a "Kansas field trip" with a visiting French executive could yield an enjoyable story!) Growing flowers and vegetables, entertaining friends and family, playing games and cards, singing, piano, cooking and baking are all hobbies Joyce enjoys. She stresses how important friends have been in her life, walking with her through

many tough times. A special group of friends from Goessel High (including former BCMC custodian Grace Regier) continues to meet monthly for lunch and a variety of activities of their choosing.

She has lived at Schowalter Villa since April of 2011, enjoying her neighbors, and working with the annual garage sale there. She also volunteers at BCMC helping with funerals and driving people to medical appointments.

Covid restrictions have challenged her to be more intentional about keeping in touch with people important to her. Favorite Bible passages include the Book of John and some of the Psalms, but choosing a favorite hymn is not possible. There are too many good ones! A quote that has stood her in good stead: "When life gives you lemons, make lemonade!"

Happy 80th Birthday Jan Albertson! August 8, 1941



Janice (Jan) Siemens Albertson grew up on a farm east of Buhler. She was born August 8, 1941 to Herman and Clara Sie-

mens, the second of four children. Her love of the outdoors began when she was very young. She was happiest when working with her dad and their livestock. Staying indoors and cleaning were avoided as much as possible. She was a 4H member for seven years. For 1st grade she attended a small country grade school with seven other children. A favorite memory is when the teacher took all seven students to the Buhler drug store and treated them to an ice cream soda—the first one she'd ever had. Grades 2-8, Jan attended another country grade school where she eventually became a cheerleader and played basketball. She graduated from Buhler High School where she met her high school sweetheart, John Albertson. They were married by Harold Thiezen in 1963. She attended Bethel College. After John graduated from Wichita State, they moved to Wichita where he was working on a Master's Degree in Music. It was during this time that they met their Canadian Mennonite friends: the Sawatskys and Pauls. The men were all music majors working on their Masters and they could all speak low German. After graduating, they kept in touch, but were busy raising families. On John and Jan's 25th wedding anniversary, they traveled to Canada and reconnected with them. Since then, they have traveled extensively with themtraveling through western Canada more than 15 times as well as traveling to Germany, Austria, and Switzerland.

Jan and John moved to Kansas City for their careers. Both of them worked in the Kansas City, KS school district. Jan stayed in the district for 20 years and even after retirement continued to substitute

teach for 15 years. She was a para and a substitute in the Special Ed department and worked at the State School for the Blind working with students of all ages. One day she might be taking a vocational ed student to his/her job and help teach them the skills needed, such as teaching them how to fold towels and sheets, if their job was in housekeeping. Another day, she might go to the dorm and teach the students how to clean their rooms or bathrooms. During her lunch hour, she might go and purchase groceries for a student's meal that he/she would be cooking in Home Economics. She loved her job and didn't retire from substituting until one month before their move to Hesston.

Jan and John had acreage in the country near Kansas City, KS. In 1998, they were notified that their home was in the middle of the soon to be built Kansas Speedway. They were given a set amount and there was no choice as to whether to accept it or not. After looking for quite some time, they finally decided to move their existing ranch brick home seven miles to some other land that they owned. The good news was that after the house was moved, they decided to improve it. They built a finished basement and enlarged the kitchen. The bad news was that it cost a lot more than was offered by Kansas Speedway.

John and Jan have three children. Jason is a veteri-

narian in Wichita, Janelle is a **Communications Specialist in** the Brighton School District near Denver, CO and JoLynn is a speech pathologist in the Lawrence Public School District. They also have six grandchildren. In 2014, John and Jan moved to Schowalter Villa in Hesston where they enjoy getting together with their neighbors. With COVID, they now meet in driveways, weather permitting, and visit and catch up for an hour or so. Still loving the outdoors, Jan has met a young, local family who walks the trail in back of their home, so much so, Jan gave them a gift after their last baby was born.

One of Jan's favorite Bible verses is John 3:16 which she has taught to all of her grandchildren. They appreciate four part singing and she favors the Charles Wesley Hymns that were sung often at the Methodist Church they attended in Kansas City and where John directed the choir for over 30 years. They agreed from the beginning that the family would attend church together. It was such a pleasure to get to know Jan a little better. Her positive outlook and love of life shine through. Happy 80th Birthday Janet Voth! October 8, 1941

Janet Klaassen Voth was born in Mountain Lake, Minnesota October 8, 1941. She comes from a family with a long history with



Bethel College as well as with current and former members of the Bethel College Mennonite

Church. Her father, Nick, was a teacher and her mother, Marcella, was a nurse. Her grandfather, Isaac J. Dick was in the second college graduating class of Bethel College (there were only three students in the class). Janet is the oldest of four siblings: Elaine, Joel and Mark. While living in Mountain Lake. Justina Neufeld came to Mt. Lake as a refugee, so they have known each other a long time. Janet's father was an Industrial Arts teacher before becoming a principal. While her father was working on his Master's Degree, Janet would help him with his research to predict enrollment increase by helping him compute numbers. Marilyn Kliewer Harrold was the school secretary for her father. Janet's parents moved the family to Hillsboro in 1955, to be closer to Bethel, to encourage their children to attend there. Janet first became interested in the sciences while attending school in Mountain Lake and it continued in Hillsboro where her chemistry teacher was also a **Chemistry Professor at Tabor** College. She was the first female in at least 12 years to take physics at Hillsboro High School in 1958-59. In 1959, her parent's wish was granted as Janet attended Bethel College. She graduated in 1963 with a major in Chemistry and Minors in Math and Physics. Her first

quarter at Bethel, she was one of four girls in Math, by the second quarter she was the only one that remained. During her time at Bethel. she met Orvin in the lab. On May 31, 1963 they were married by her grandfather with Elbert Koontz, pastor at First Mennonite Church, Hillsboro, being part of the ceremony and Rosalind Enns Andreas the soloist. Alice Loewen Kreider provided the organ music. While Orvin finished at Bethel College, she taught 3rd grade in Sedgwick.

Orvin and Janet spent their next two years of marriage working for Mennonite Central Committee in Newfoundland where Janet taught science and math to students in grades 7-11. One of their homes during this time was only 100 yards from the ocean. Janet and Orvin fell in love with this Canadian province and have been back at least eight times. Upon returning to the states, Janet and Orvin moved back to North Newton. Janet taught Science and Math first in Halstead and then in Hillsboro, KS. The National Science Foundation funded her Master's Degree through Notre Dame. During this time, she and Orvin were also youth sponsors at BCMC with several other couples over a six year time span. After almost 10 years of teaching, Janet decided it was time to go in a different direction, so she went to work at Dunhill of Wichita, an employment agency, and worked there four years. She then changed jobs and went to work for CertainTeed in McPherson where she was part of the Technical Team Research and Development group, creating new recipes for vinyl pipe, siding and windows, Quality Control testing of incoming raw materials, as well as a Rep to ASTM (American Society for Testing

and Materials) where she attended conventions and wrote procedures for handling Raw Materials, which are still being followed. She stayed with them for 9 ½ years when she was terminated right before she and Orvin left for a vacation in Australia and New Zealand. Upon her return, CertainTeed hired her back but in a different division.

From 1992-1997, Janet moved to Charlotte, North Carolina where she worked in a chemistry lab. Janet and Orvin had a long-distance marriage where they would travel back and forth during major holidays. She was also active in the Moravian Church which was supportive of the LGBTQ community as well as practicing infant and adult baptism and community involvement. Her position at the lab was eliminated in 1996 and since she had committed to staying in North Carolina till 1997, she taught for one year in a high school program for at risk freshmen. This is where she met Crystal, and Janet and Orvin began a new journey as foster parents for Crystal and then for the children of Crystal's friend, Jessica. Jessica is the mother of Jon and Ian, both of whom Janet and Orvin are still parenting. Jon's friend, Christian, also lived with them for five years. From fall of 1997 to March 29,2007, after working in the incoming raw materials group of the quality control department 9 1/2 years, she retired from Abbott Labs/ Hospira. Besides returning to Newfoundland on various occasions, Janet enjoyed her time on the Bethel College Board from 1987-1999. She chaired Committee for 20 years with Harold Moyer as executive secretary. Circle of Hope is also verv dear to her heart. Another

cherished memory is the 2014 Bicycle Trip that she, Orvin, Jon and Ian and Christian took, bicycling, or riding in the van. Orvin rode all 3700 miles on his bike. They left Newton May 23 and arrived in Fairbanks July 23. They joined WarmShowers.org on this trip and in turn have put their name on the list to host bikers coming through the area. Before COVID, they had around 70 bicyclists, from all over the world, stay in their home in one summer. Another favorite activity they both did before she went to North Carolina was to host around 10 BC students in their home one Sunday evening a month.
